Projects completed:

- Room #8 on *Lubega Memorial Clinic* is complete. The clinic was painted both inside and outside.
- Biogas system completely installed. Will be in operation by a team from Hunter Street Church in February.
- Container with cooler/freezer and other goods, shipped from U.S. in May, arrived on site in Uganda in August.

Projects underway:

- Chicken raising, starting with 40 laying hens and 40 broilers. Currently raising the second batch, which when sold will finish covering the start-up cost and begin making a profit for the ministry.
- In exchange for the physical and financial oversight of a grain mill located in Kakooge, ACM will be able to buy maizemeal for the feeding ministry at 15% discount.
- Proverbs 31 Women's Ministry earned over \$2000.00 this year from their U.S. sales of beaded jewelry.

Missionaries:

- Wayne & Mary Daniel spent most of 2010 in the U.S. in new positions for fundraising, missionary recruiting and administration. Mary is marketing jewelry for the women of Proverbs 31 Women's Ministry and working with the ACM Administrator. Wayne flew to Uganda in September for a 7 week visit on the field.
- Both Wayne & Mary attended the wedding of Uganda National Director, Carlos Pambala, on January 30.
- Arley and Miranda Lund are raising their funds to return to Uganda as resident field missionaries. They had a very positive impact their first visit on the field. We and National staff members are looking forward to their return when their funding requirements are met.

National Staff:

- Moses Ngeera, Kenya National Director, established Sunday schools in 13 churches in his area for the purpose of child evangelism. The Sunday School Discipleship Program (SSDP) reaches 300 children. Additionally, at least 100 children, members of churches in Meru, Kenya, meet in groups at alternating churches once a month. Moses both initiated and leads these ministries.
- Uganda National Director, Carlos Pambala, was married on January 30. A baby boy was born to Carlos and his wife Rose on Nov. 24th.
- In February ACM hired 2 teachers for Ekitangaala Primary School. We ended the year with 18 employees, 17 fulltime and 1 part time.

Mission Volunteers:

ACM hosted 12 mission teams this year! They were comprised of 43 volunteers accompanied by 7 young family members. Most of them stayed from 2 weeks to 3 months and participated in ministry activities from playing a keyboard for the children's singing to teaching Nationals how to pull teeth! Below is a list of our visiting teams:

- Bruce Cunningham, a dentist in Alabama, led a team of 3 to teach dental skills to ACM head nurse and other Nationals. Since then we have not referred any dental patients, but treated them in our own Lubega Clinic.
- Matthew McIntyre and Charles Pendley, his company chaplain, both from Texas, visited with their sons. Among other ministry activities, they met with and minister to personally sponsored children.
- David Semeyn from Arkansas returned for several weeks and worked with ACM staff to start a mobile Bible Training Center for Pastors and Church Leaders (BTCP&CL) program to teach in remote villages.
- From Minnesota Arley & Miranda Lund worked 3 months, with a view to return w/their 3 children long term.
- Two other families made "vision trips" this year: Jason & Sara Tierney from N.C. and their four children and Jeff, Alice, and daughter, Elizabeth, McWhorter from Texas.
- Three volunteers from Georgia, led by Hundley Harkleroad, came to Uganda for two weeks.
- Bible teacher, Tom Leighow, from N.C. came to teach in the Bible Training Center for Pastors (BTCP).
- We had a team of 7 from Arizona, Nevada, California, and Wisconsin, led by Jennifer Woodrow.
- A team of 2, Sara Beth Tolan & Joy Robbins, from Pennsylvania helped ACM's many ministries for 3 months.
- 2 Ugandan university interns volunteered. Sebunya Richard, an ACM graduate attending Makerere, did social work and administration. The other young man, from Bugema University, taught farming techniques.
- A team of 14 from Hunter Street Baptist Church was led by Wes Wilbanks. They spent 2 weeks installing the biogas system. Team members were from Alabama, S.C. & Tennessee.

USAID / Health Initiatives in the Public Sector (HIPS) Grant:

- Our staff in Uganda works with the youth through primary and secondary schools. One of the purposes when they meet is to encourage abstinence.
- The staff also sponsors child protection seminars for the guardians and caregivers of orphans and vulnerable children in surrounding villages. To date 480 caregivers have been trained in child protection.
- With the HIPS grant ACM enabled over 100 households this year to improve economically through income-generation projects. One example is agricultural assistance including farming equipment, better farming techniques, and seed distribution.
- The benefits of this grant to the surrounding community are too many to cover in this report. A complete annual report, including all facets of the use of the HIPS grant is available.

Comments:

- Our Uganda Tax Identification Number (TIN) was received in July. The TIN will enable ACM to obtain tax relief on items shipped into the country by container and major purchases, such as vehicles.
- Christmas Activity Days were held in Uganda and Kenya. The children heard the Christmas story from Scripture, sang carols, and played games. They were served a special meal and each received a gift.
- We (Wayne & Mary) are both enjoying good health and count it a blessing to serve God through ACM and a unique pleasure to serve and work with each of you. We are grateful for your commitment, encouragement, generosity, friendship, and Christian love. Thank you for all you do for the ministry and for us! Wayne & Mary
